

#### Message from the Head of Elementary

Disney had a busy summer, with two classics from the 1990's hitting theatres. Both the revamped Lion King and Aladdin returned, with box-office domination. The characters, songs and storyline that touched our hearts in the midnineties, have once again captivated us. As many of us will recall, Aladdin details the story of an Arabian street urchin, who disguises himself as a wealthy prince, and tries to impress the Sultan and his daughter, while The Lion King depicts the dilemma of Simba, who must choose between 'hakuna matata' (a life of no worries) and taking his place as the ruler of the animal kingdom.

Carmel children have not missed a moment of the Disney excitement. Choir sessions have been overrun by the Aladdin and Lion King soundtracks while morning recesses are host to debates, with the children pitting the worth of Zazu, the hornbill and begrudged caretaker of Simba, against Genie, the tritagonist in Disney's Aladdin.

And when the morning bell rings, the children's jury concludes unanimously that Simba's 'Circle of Life' gets their vote.

And I can see why.

When all is said and done, our children want to live lives infused with meaning, where they feel that they are contributing (like Simba eventually did) to the greater good and to making a difference to the world. While 'hakuna matata' makes for a great, upbeat interlude in the world

of Disney, a 'no worries' attitude doesn't really move our children's world. They are drawn back, time and again, to looking at the world around them, to driving action for change and focusing on the impact that they can have on the lives of others.

The month of *Elul*, we are taught, is about spiritual reflection and reconnection, about charity and doing for others, and as Lord Rabbi Sacks so eloquently says, about 'Course Correction'. It is the time of year that the sound of the *Shofar* calls us to action, imploring us to take stock of our lives and to consider the role that we play personally, communally and even globally.

During the months of *Elul* and *Tishrei* I am always reminded that with the passing of time things look different. Trends come and go, thinking adapts and political and technological developments impact how we live, but the Circle of Life continues as a constant, urging us to consider, as Simba did, the part that we play.

From all of us at Carmel Elementary, we take this opportunity to wish our families and friends *Shana Tova Umetukah*. May you all be blessed and inscribed in the 'Book of Life'.

Kindergarten has started their reading and writing journey, learning the sounds "m", "a" and "s". They have been engaging in a lot of fun multi-sensory activities that expose them to these letters. We are so excited to see our little Literacy learners bloom.













































#### **Grade 1: Who We Are**

It has been a great start to the year for Grade 1. We have been busy getting back into the school routine, familiarising ourselves with what we already know and getting excited about the many things we will learn and discover over the new school year. We have commenced two different units of inquiry - Sharing the Planet - which is our year-long, whole school unit as well as Who We Are. In addition to this, we have been broadening our understanding of number sense and focusing on recount writing, basic sight words and picking up reading books as often as possible. There is a positive atmosphere of thinking and learning happening in the classroom and we are looking forward to building on this in the coming months.

As Grade 1 inquire further into our current Unit of Inquiry about Who We Are, with the Central Idea being "The people in our lives and the choices we make influence who we are", we have been focusing on the different choices we can make and how these can influence others. To help identify positive choices we can make to help others, we watched and then read the story "Have You Filled a Bucket Today?", the main takeaway from the book being that we all carry an 'invisible bucket' and have the power to help fill the buckets of others by saying positive and kind things. We can also dip into people's buckets by doing and saying unkind things and so we should think carefully about our choices and how they can affect others. Taking this idea further as a whole Grade, we made our own individual buckets using paper cups and then went around putting stars and hearts in the buckets of others while saying supportive, encouraging statements to "fill each other's bucket". The students really enjoyed this activity and it was nice to hear all the positive things being said about each other. We encouraged more specific statements like "thank you for being such a kind and caring friend to me every day by playing nicely with me on the playground" rather than "I like your hair".





















## Grade 2 Investigate Natural Disasters Unit of Inquiry

For our Unit of Inquiry on Natural Disasters, Grade 2 students completed a STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math) project. They worked in pairs to build a hurricane resistant house.

After reading the scientific facts about hurricanes, dams, and levees, students designed homes to withstand wind and flood damage. They had fun designing and building their homes and enjoyed testing them out!



















### **Grade 3 Do the Numbers**

Grade 3 students joined forces in order to consolidate their learning about place value. Students participated in a variety of activities over the course of several days.

The activities included playing place value *Yahtzee*, using a computer to generate random numbers, and ordering the numbers from greatest to least. Some students also created a *Kahoot* so that they can test their classmate's knowledge, while others used dice and place value mats while playing a game to create the largest numbers possible.

During these activities, students needed to cooperate and collaborate with their peers in order to complete the tasks. The students had a lot of fun learning with their classmates!









## Grade 2 & 3: Field Trip to the Space Museum

Grades 2 and 3 have been inquiring into Natural Disasters as part of our "How the World Works" Unit of Inquiry. We went on our first field trip to the Space Museum together to learn more about Volcanoes.

We took the Star Ferry over to Kowloon and had lunch overlooking Hong Kong Island. We then went into the *OMNIMAX* Theatre in the Space Museum to see the documentary *'Volcanoes: The Fires of Creation'*. We left with a greater understanding of how volcanoes form, the different places volcanoes exist and visually saw active volcanoes erupt in different parts of the world.














## Grade 4 and 5 Discover Who We Are

Grade 4 and 5 have begun their new unit of inquiry under the transdisciplinary theme of 'Who We Are'.

**Our central idea is** "Human body systems are interconnected and influence our health and well-being."

In order to carry out the first part of their inquiry, 'finding out,' the students were encouraged to use books, the internet, speak to experts, use augmented reality, and explored the app 'Tinybop,' utilising the full range of their available toolbox.














## Bringing in the Jewish New Year

## **What is Rosh Hashanah?**

Rosh Hashanah translates as "the head of the year" and marks the creation of the World. It is one of the most important and significant days in the Jewish calendar where we observe and celebrate the end of one year and the beginning of the next.

It is considered to be the holiest day in the Jewish calendar and is usually spent in prayer and fasting.

Although the festival is a chance to enjoy time spent with friends and family, it is also a time for reflection, prayer and acts of kindness. On Rosh Hashanah we commence the 10 days of repentance, culminating in the holiest day of the Jewish year, Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement.

# How is Rosh Hashanah celebrated?

Rosh Hashanah 2019 will start on Sunday 29 September at sundown and end on Tuesday 1 October at nightfall. The two days are spent in prayer, study and feasting with family and friends.

Customs include sounding the shofar, a hollowed-out ram's horn. The shofar's 100 blasts will be heard in synagogues around the world, symbolising the call to repentance.

Symbolic foods such as apples dipped in honey, and dates are eaten to represent a "sweet new year".

Fish heads symbolise the head of the year, and pomegranates, which are said to have 613 seeds represent the 613 commandments.

Children at Carmel Elementary spent the month of Elul, the final month of the Jewish year, preparing for Rosh Hashanah, learning about its customs and traditions, and sampling its symbolic foods.



















## **Professional Development**

Carmel Elementary faculty congregated on Tuesday afternoon for a Professional Development with a spiritual focus. In the lead up to the Jewish New Year, Rosh Hashanah, teachers received an informal hands-on session on the traditions and symbolism observed during the holiday. Teachers heard about words such as Tefillah, Tzedakah and Teshuva and what they represent.

### Aline's Apple Cake

Pears can be substituted for apples. This is my mother-in-law's recipe. Her motto is "never cook anything that is not quick and easy to prepare," Easy for her to say - she's a wonderful cook!!

- 1. Preheat over to 180°c/350 °F
- 2. Beat eggs and sugar together. Add oil, vanilla and flour.
- 3. Peel and cut apples into eights. Cut a few thin slices.
- 4. Grease cake pan. Pour batter into cake pan and sink apples into batter "standing up". Place thinner slices on the top.
- 5. Bake for 45-50 minutes. After removing cake from oven, immediately pour cognac on top.

#### You will need:

3 Eggs 3/4 cup Sugar 1 tsp. Vanilla

2 tsp. Baking powder

1 cup Flour
3 Apples
2-3 tsp. Cognac
1/2 cup Oil

Margarine (to grease pan)
