In this week's Parsha, Lech-Lecha, we begin an entirely new period in the world's history. We meet Abraham, whose children would become the Jewish Nation. From this point on, the relationship between G-d and the children of Abraham will dominate the remainder of the Torah. However, the Torah also clarifies that the ultimate purpose of His special relationship and covenant with the descendants of Abraham is the restoration of the entire world.

The parsha opens with G-d's renowned phrase to Abraham – Lech Lecha – "Get out of your country, from your family and from your father's house, to a land that I will show you". By then, Abraham was already 75 years old. The question that arises is why did G-d choose a man so advanced in age, and why him at all? The Torah does not give us an answer to that question and when we read it, it doesn't say why Abraham and why at this point. However, the Midrash (Rabbi's commentary) has come up with two different explanations to this question.

The first says that G-d's reason is not comprehensible to humans. The Torah doesn't mention the reason for Abraham being chosen on purpose, as if to tell

that us it is not the most important element. The Torah understands that if it had mentioned the exact reasons, we would have thought that only by doing those exact acts we can be close to G-d. Therefore the Torah teaches us that from the moment Abraham was chosen we are all part of his legacy, regardless of our exact behavior.

The second answer adds to the first by saying that the Torah chose to introduce us to Abraham only from the moment he was ordered and given a mission. The Torah teaches us that only then - when he got the mission to start his journey to Israel - the Promised Land, does he become significant. The message the Torah sends us is that every person, even as great as Abraham, becomes meaningful only when they take on an obligation which is heavenly and greater than their action so far.

In a sense, both interpretations are meaningful. We know nothing about Abraham's righteousness before G-d's call - however, we do know how faithful and obedient he was after he was commanded. It isn't the words of G-d that make this story so special. It is how Abraham responded to G-d's commands.

Since 2002 'Wear it Pink Day' has raised over GBP£31.5 million (USD\$41.2 million) for life-saving research that's working to discover how to prevent breast cancer, how to detect it earlier and how to treat it effectively at every stage in order stop the disease taking lives.

## Navigating American Higher Education Perspectives from the Inside

"How does one start the process of deciding which US university or college to apply to?" This was the question University of Hong Kong lecturers Dr. Elizabeth LaCouture and her husband Dr. Jason Petrulis, parents of Clio in Carmel Elementary G4, set out to demystify in their enlightening and well-attended lecture which took place on Tuesday night at the JCC, sponsored by the PTA and moderated by Mr. Kyle Ford, Elsa High School's Director of Academics.

Drawing on their mutual experiences in all corners of the US - from small, private liberal arts colleges to large, state-subsidised research universities, Drs. LaCouture and Petrulis spoke about the many considerations such as location (weather, urban/rural, state politics, etc), size, academics, social and extra-curricular offerings as well as Jewish life.

While pursuing a US education is a very expensive undertaking, superlative benefits abound. A US education is "...much like training up a cat and throwing it out the window - it will always land on its feet" quipped Dr Petrulis. The well-rounded education, the ability to transfer from one school to another, the availability of scholarships and other support services for students from academic to social to medical, allow the student to tailor-make an enriching path for themselves.

An informative and instructive evening – our thanks to Dr. LaCouture and Dr. Petrulis. This is the first in a series of College Counselling information evenings the PTA are arranging for this academic year – more details to follow.

## I, Robot by Isaac Asimov

Isaac Asimov creates the Three Laws of Robotics and ushers in the Robot Age.

Earth is ruled by master-machines but the Three Laws of Robotics have been designed to ensure humans maintain the upper hand:

- 1) A robot may not injure a human being or allow a human being to come to harm.
- 2) A robot must obey orders given to it by human beings except where such orders would conflict with the First Law.
- 3) A robot must protect its own existence as long as such protection does not conflict with the First or Second Law.

But what happens when a rogue robot's idea of what is good for society contravenes the Three Laws?


