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Dvar Torah: Ki Tisa

In this week's Parsha, Ki Tisa, we read about one of the best known events in the Torah - the story of the sin of the golden calf. According to the story, after receiving the Ten commandments, the people of Israel camped near Mt. Sinai while Moshe went up the mountain to receive the rest of the Mitzvot. Moshe spent forty days and nights on the mountain while the rest of the nation waited at the bottom. While Moshe was absent, the people of Israel felt abandoned and a decision was made to build a golden calf to worship. After doing so, Moshe was ordered to go down the mountain and when he saw the nation bowing down to the calf, he reacted by breaking the tablets he had spent so long collecting.

When we read what the people of Israel did, the question arises as to how come they sinned so severely. The nation witnessed miracles and major events such as the Ten Plagues, the splitting of the Red Sea and they heard G-d himself. How come that after all of those extraordinary events, the people of Israel decided to sin so seriously?


The answer to this question brings us back to the effect of major events in the Torah. The 10 plagues and the splitting of the sea are examples of major events that are limited to what we would have thought. As powerful as they are, they had a very small influence on the people of Israel themselves. By

receiving the Torah, Moshe shows a different way to direct the people. By receiving the Torah and the Mitzvot, we are committed to a daily demanding routine that is more durable and brings a bigger and better influence on the people of Israel. Our tradition is not based only on major miracles, but on long journeys that build our identity step by step. Saying that, no one can deny that from time to time, people need events and experiences that are external to daily life. It seems that the balance between the two is what builds the Jewish pathway.

In our lives, we have a day to day routine as well as powerful experiences that are outside our regular daily schedule; they all have significance and importance. Going to school every day and learning is our routine. We already understand it has its own strength derived from being repeated and framed. On the other hand, from time to time, we all need to get out of the routine to grow by experiencing things that can be experienced only through remarkable events; the Educational Visits are a good example of this. The balance between the Educational Visits and our daily routine is what makes us a better person.

FIRST Robotics CompetitionFinal Update



At 12:50 on Wednesday 20th February 2019, after a bit of a scramble to fix bumpers onto the frame of our robot, the Elsa Robotics Team (aka PRISM 7242) placed the seal on the bag that contained our robot and in so doing signalled the end of the build season. A collective sigh of relief was heard and proud smiles filled Room 103, our new robotics lab. We had done it!

We have a robot that will accompany us to New York in March and allow us to participate in an opportunity of a lifetime. No other school in Hong Kong can say that they built a functional robot and travelled halfway around the world to compete in the most prestigious school robotics competition on earth. By the end of March, Elsa High School will be able to say just that.

It all started with a single student with an interest in robotics. That interest slowly spread amongst the students, and under the supervision of Mr Gravett, turned into a fully fledged school robotics programme. Our first year was a very challenging one, with our school being the only FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC) team in Hong Kong, and with limited guidance and funding. However, against all expectations, against all odds, we managed to send a working robot, packed with a code to drive both remotely and autonomously.

The story of the battle against all odds quickly spread throughout the school, with leaders such as Mr Gravett and Steven Zhou getting many appraisals for their achievements despite this being the first year. This helped cultivate interest towards Robotics in our school, and more and more people with hidden interests for Robotics stepped up to receive the torch.

This year we had more experience, knowledge, and resources and our team was a lot more dedicated. With the continual support of the Science Department and from mentors outside of school, we were able to grow our team's potential which was now well equipped to handle the extreme demands that getting a working robot to New York would entail. Our marketing team managed to secure the sponsorship of the Lan Kwai Fong Group and our engineering team managed to achieve feats that we as a junior team could have only dreamed of last year.

Now it's on to New York.

The New York event is said to be one of the most competitive regional events in America with some of the most well-known teams in attendance. The competition begins with practice matches followed by qualifying matches. After the rounds of qualifying matches, the top 8 teams get to select their alliance members from the remaining pool of teams. These alliances consist of three teams each then competing in the knockout matches, finally ending with one team being crowned the winners.

For us to actually win the event would not be a realistic expectation. Our goal this year is to score points in every qualifying match and it would be a bonus achievement to be selected in an alliance. Whatever the outcome we will enjoy the experience.

The team would like to thank Mrs Friedmann and all the staff and students who have supported us throughout this season. We hope to do you all proud in New York.

Nonetheless, we kept our heads high and hoped for the best possible outcome.

Prior to the game, we received some valuable and stimulating words from our coach. Shortly after, he revealed the starting lineups to us, which consisted of Joshua Jay in goal, Aryeh, Ori, Alon, and Tal defending, Benji, Charlie, Mordechai, Dan, and Eitan in midfield, and Marco up front. The game started off firmly with a fair amount of chances from Elsa and with us retaining the majority possession on the ball. Speak by Laurie Halse Anderson


"Speak up for yourself - we want to know what you have to say."



Their daughters, who have never heard these stories, think their mothers' advice is irrelevant to their modern American lives – until their own inner crises reveal how much they've unknowingly inherited of their mothers' pasts.

לפני כחודש נפטר עמוס עוז, אחד מהסופרים הישראלים הגדולים, החשובים והמוכשרים ביותר. לזכרו אני רוצה להמליץ על הקריאה באחד מספריו המוקדמים, "מיכאל שלי".

גיבורת הספר, חנה גרינבאום, היא צעירה ירושלמית בשנות ה-50 של המאה ה-20. היא פוגשת באוניברסיטה העברית בסטודנט לגיאולוגיה בשם מיכאל גונן, והספר מגולל את סיפור נישואיהם ואהבתם (או שמא יש לומר חוסר אהבתם). הקול המספר הוא קולה של חנה העצובה, החולמת

על עולמות מסעירים ורחוקים בעודה כלואה בשכונה ירושלמית קטנה, דחוקה ודוחקת.

עוז עושה כאן את הבלתי אפשרי, ומצליח לתאר בגוף ראשון את עולמה הפנימי הכבד של אישה, עם כל המחוות הקטנות, הניואנסים, הרגשות והתחושות בשפה ייחודית וקולעת.
